CLASS SCHEDULE

The first two classes for the *Legal Internship Course* will meet on **Sunday, June 2nd**, from 9 to 11 a.m. Interns will also have two additional evening sessions with the Internship Director, at times to be announced in the spring. The first class for *International Intellectual Property* (IIP) will also meet on Sunday, June 2nd from 11:15 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Thereafter, classes will meet as set forth below.

The examinations for *European Union Constitutional Law* and *European Union Economic Law* will be administered on the morning of **Friday, June 14th** and for *International Intellectual Property* on the morning of **Saturday, June 29th**. Due dates for take-home examinations/papers in the other courses will be scheduled at a later date.

Due to ABA regulations, students may not enroll in more than three courses (which includes the *Legal Internship Course*) in a two-week period.

TRANSFER CREDIT

Acceptance of any credit or grade for any course taken in the program, including the Legal Internship Course, is subject to determination by the student's home school. Students should check carefully with their home schools for rules regarding the transfer of credit. Satisfaction of law school residency requirements must be confirmed by each student with the student's home institution.

ATTENDANCE POLICY

A student in this program will be withdrawn from any course in which the student is absent for more than 20% of the class periods, i.e., more than two classes in a one-credit course and more than four classes in a two-credit course. To be counted as present, a student must be present for the entire class period. If a student is withdrawn from a course on the basis of poor attendance, the student will receive no credit and no tuition refund for the course. The Executive Director of the Program, in his or her sole discretion, may substitute an option of additional or make-up course work if all absences are due to extraordinary circumstances beyond the student's control, such as serious illness or a death in the family. Any absences that do not result in withdrawal from a class may still negatively affect the grade received for that class.

REQUIREMENTS FOR STUDENT PERFORMANCE AND GRADING METHOD

To receive academic credit, students must satisfy the requirements imposed by course instructors concerning class participation, readings, class attendance, written assignments or papers and/or final examinations and comply with the Program attendance policy (see above). All requirements for student performance will be no less rigorous than courses at the students' home schools. Students are expected to attend class on a regular basis and be well prepared for each class.

All classes will be graded on a letter basis, in accordance with the University of Tulsa grading system. This system uses the following grades: A, A-, B+, B, B-, C+, C, C-, D+, D, D- and F. Assessment for purposes of assigning grades may include in-class or take-home examinations or papers or a combination of methods. Information regarding assessment methods is provided in the Program Handbook (distributed in the spring), the syllabi, and/or by the instructors. Interpretation of any grade for courses taken in the program is subject to determination by the student's home institution. Administration of examinations, grading, and the process for grade appeals will be subject to the University of Tulsa College of Law Policies and Regulations, which are posted on the University of Tulsa College of Law portal under Academic Policies.

UNIVERSITY OF TULSA COLLEGE OF LAW HONOR CODE

Every student participating in study abroad is held to have notice of the high standards of conduct demanded by the University of Tulsa College of Law. Students are required to conduct themselves with the highest degree of honesty, integrity, and trustworthiness while representing the University of Tulsa College of Law in programs abroad. Each student is required to read the Honor Code and your agreement to the Liability Release form at the time of application indicates receipt of this document with the program application materials. ADD/DROP POLICY

You are allowed to add or drop a classroom course during the first week of classes, subject to the attendance policy set forth above. The drop/add period for International Children's Rights and The Multinational Corporation and Human Rights, which do not start until June 18th, will be the first two days of the courses, June 18th and 19th. After the first week, you will not be able to add a class under any circumstances and you will be permitted to drop a class only with permission of the Program Director, for extraordinary circumstances. The drop policy for the Legal Internship course is more restrictive and is explained in the Overview of the Internship Program memorandum. Be aware that if you obtain a loan for the program, you may have to repay monies back to your lender if you drop a class. Contact your financial aid department for further information.



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
